Recently, Dr. Paul Ash, Superintendent, began the process of engaging the school community in a dialogue regarding the development of "Mission, Vision, and Core Beliefs" for the Lexington Public Schools. The process began by presenting a draft to the School Committee and to all school department employees. This draft mission, vision, and beliefs is a result of the focused collaboration of the nine principals and the central administration. I was inspired by the discussion and the process was a unifying experience for us. (The draft is below).

During the next year, Dr. Ash will ask each school to review this work and will seek input and suggestions for refinements and improvements. His goal is to present a final recommendation to the School Committee in the spring of 2014. As a starting point at Harrington, we will discuss these statements at **School Council** and look at the ways we are aligned in our school improvement efforts. We will continue to work on three key areas: Academic, Pro-social, and Parent Engagement. Using the mission, vision, and beliefs as a guide, we will set priorities and translate these words into action. Thank you for your continued support of our school and our school system as we continue on our journey together.

DRAFT Mission Statement

The mission of the Lexinaton Public Schools is to provide all students with a world-class education that ensures academic excellence in a culture of caring and respectful relationships.

DRAFT Vision Statement

All educators engage in effective instruction that prepares and inspires students to successfully meet the challenges of a diverse and changing world. All children get what they need, when they need it, and all adults are collaborative teachers, learners, and leaders.

DRAFT Beliefs

We believe that...

1. All students can learn at high levels when they are motivated through teaching that is rigorous, relevant, and designed to meet their individual learning needs.

- 2. Honoring diversity in an inclusive culture will achieve equity and excellence for all students.

The Harrington School Site Council is an advisory group comprised of Harrington faculty, administration, parents, and a community representative. The Council discusses school improvement initiatives and looks at issues from multiple perspectives. Four parents serve on the council, each serving a 2-year term. The terms are staggered so that each year two new parent terms begin and two parents return from the previous year. We meet one Tuesday per month from 7:30-8:30am. Parent members need to have children attending Harrington for both years of their term.

If you are interested in serving as a parent representative in 2013-14, please submit a brief statement that can be shared with the parent community about your candidacy to the principal, Elaine Mead, by May 20, 2013. The statement should be one paragraph (no more than 200 words). An election will be held, if needed, the last

week in May to select the new parent representatives.

Harrington School Council: Transportation

Harrington's Site Council recently received an update on recommendations and action items presented to the School Committee, Board of Selectmen, and PTA President's Council regarding school traffic safety. In 2013, a few Harrington parents have expressed concern that some parents are not following Harrington's traffic rules by dropping off their students in the parking lot. This problem mirrors a growing minority of parents town-wide that, despite multiple communication attempts, continue to purposefully not follow school procedures. Efforts are underway by the ad hoc School Transportation and Safety Study Committee, Traffic Safety Advisory Committee, Safe Routes To School, and LPS Administration to evaluate, streamline, and educate safe and sensible traffic flow and posted rule enforcement to parents and staff.

Action items being addressed this spring and summer include the competition, recommendation review, and implementation based on available funding of a school zone evaluation grant. In addition to working with principals and parents, LPS Administration hopes to use the same consultant to conduct a similar study of school traffic patterns and signage on all school properties.

Clearer, consistent arrival and dismissal procedures and signage hope to be in place for the first day of school. Stay tuned for communication updates of any proposed changes over the summer months!

Green Team @ Harrington

The Green Team is a group of parents passionate about preserving our environment, increasing education and awareness at school and home on environmental issues, and making Lexington a Greener place to live. This team works with Harrington staff and administration to assess all current "green" efforts. It also works with other Lexington elementary schools, the DPW, and the town to increase awareness and decrease the school's carbon footprint through various programming and interventions.

The Harrington community received an award from Green Schools, a Massachusetts nonprofit organization, for this program! Check out the award case at the school.

Green Lunches is our school's lunch recycling program. At the beginning of each year staff and parent volunteers review with students those items that can be recycled such as clean trays and water bottles. When a student recycles they can record this event on a tally sheet in the cafeteria. This allows us to see how many people

recycle at Harrington each day. The 5th graders coordinate the tallying and announce the numbers each week.


In schools, about 80% of trash comes from the cafeteria, and three quarters of that is organic (biodegradable). That's why programs like "Green Lunches" are so important. In schools from Massachusetts to Minneapolis and beyond, students are composting their food scraps, paper trash, and other biodegradable waste instead of throwing it into the trash. That saves on disposal costs for the school, as well as being good for the environment.

Harrington's "Green Lunches" and other environmental initiatives have really taken off. The Green Lunches program that started at Harrington School years ago has been a team effort from the custodian staff, support staff, and a small amount of effort from parents (eight days at the beginning of the year). But the students really run the show. Each lunch period students from kindergarten to 5th grade recycle as much trash as possible. With little assistance from parent volunteers children have been recycling trays, small fruit cup holders, and pouring out drinks to recycle bottles and cartons.

Electronics and ink cartridge recycling is another ecological program being championed by Harrington's Green Team. Every Thursday morning Harrington's 5th graders and the Harrington Green Team conduct a recycling fundraiser. There is nothing to buy. We are simply asking Harrington families to protect the environment by donating used consumer electronics. These used items will be recycled in accordance with EPA regulations. 100% of the proceeds will go to Harrington's PTA.

Big Backyard: The Earthworms, Robins & Big Backyarders Return

The arrival of the first robins is a welcome sign of spring, and with robins returning, it's time to salute another sign of spring: the lowly earthworm. They migrate only a few feet, but the timing of their arrival makes earthworms the unsuna heroes of robin migration.

In the fall, earthworms migrate deeper into the earth, below the frost line. Sometimes they ball up to reduce moisture loss—as many as a hundred worms being bunched together. When spring comes and frost leaves the soil, the earthworms migrate upward. They appear at the surface, leaving the first castings of the new season, as soon as the average temperature of the ground reaches about 36 degrees. At the same time, the robins return from the South.

Robins find earthworms by cocking their head to the side so they can see. They have monocular vision, which means their eyes are on the side of the head, and each eye can be used independently. Contrary to popular belief, they don't hear the earthworms. This is part of the endlessly meshing gears of nature's machine—the appearance of both earthworm and robins when the thermometer rises to a given point. All over the North, the return of the humble earthworm, and the completion of its vertical migration, is a symbol of the arriving spring.

With spring comes the first grade Big Backvard spring walk and those fun 'robin eyes' the first graders put on to study robins. The kids study how seasonal changes affect animals and in particular robins. Don't forget to ask your first grader what it is like to see as robin's do!
